A CAMP-CALL CONNECTION

The summer before Nate Berkas started high school, he went on a camping trip that would change his life. Berkas said his faith journey began in earnest on a five-night visit to the Boundary Waters with Voyageurs Lutheran Ministry, an ELCA camp in Cook, MN.

"It was the first opportunity for me to feel and see and experience God in a really tangible way," Berkas said.

He went on several more trips to the area throughout high school before becoming a camp counselor in college, when he spent four successive summers working with youth at camp. "I realized through that experience that I was really passionate about outdoor ministry and really interested in pursuing that as a profession," Berkas said.

The next step in his journey came through acceptance into the ELCA's Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM) program, which is funded in part by Mission Support. Berkas, who grew up in Madagascar while his parents served as missionaries there, applied for YAGM because "it was my own opportunity to see God at work in various ways around the world and to be formed and transformed by our companions."

A highlight of Berkas' YAGM year serving alongside companions from the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Southern Africa was a weeklong camp in Cape Town. The experience affirmed in Berkas the importance of "outdoor ministry and creating space for young people to come that's outside of their normal context... and to send them back renewed and refocused."

After returning home, Berkas served for five years at the ELCA churchwide organization, stewarding the relationships between ELCA missionaries and their sponsoring congregations. His experience with the many facets of nonprofit management would later be an asset when he accepted his current position. "While I loved so much of what I was doing to support churchwide global ministries, where I feel the most called is going back to that canoe trip after eighth grade and thinking about how formative that was for my life," he said.

Today, Berkas is the site director at Wilderness Canoe Base—another ELCA camp in the Boundary Waters—where he gets to give young people the same experience he has as a camper." I feel a deep call to this type of ministry," he said. I'm grateful for the way that all of this has worked together to shape where I am."

A Miracle Sparked the Christian Movement

It was the Pentecost after Christ's resurrection, and the disciples were gathered in a house. Without warning and with the sound of rushing wind, the heavens opened. Flames crowned the disciples' heads, the Holy Spirit filled their hearts and they began speaking other languages. The phenomenon drew a crowd, and the people were bewildered. These disciples were speaking in the people's native tongues—how?

Surely these men were drunk, they thought. But Peter corrected them, going on to preach the first sermon. He declared Jesus died and rose to save them from their sins. He called on them to repent. Then he said, "For this promise is for you, for your children, and for all who are far away, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to him" (Acts 2:39). Grace—God's love freely given—is for everyone. The crowd heard this and believed; 3,000 were baptized.

Centuries later, we are still astonished by God's gift of grace. And as members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, we continue to be inspired by the Holy Spirit to share the gospel message and serve our neighbors.

Through this church's Future Directions 2025 initiative (ELCA.org/future), we're drawing inspiration from the early church as we cultivate new leaders and revitalize congregations. You'll see lots of examples in the current edition of Stories of Faith in Action (copies are available in the kiosk in Salem's narthex).

These stories are your stories too. You've made them possible through your generous gifts of Mission Support, a small percentage of your offering set aside by your congregation and synod for funding ELCA ministries on a local, national and global level. These stories are an example of all the ways we are church, we are Lutheran, we are church together, and we are church for the sake of the world.

Thank you for your faithful commitment to this church and for helping us create new stories of faith in action every day. My prayer for this church is that we continue to heed God's call: building up leaders, energizing congregations and serving as agents of grace in the Christian movement.

STEWARDSHIP

In July, Pastor Linda Johnson Seyenkulo, the missionary that we support in Africa, preached on 1 Corinthians 12:4-31.

There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but the same God works all of them in all men. Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good. To one there is given through the spirit the message of wisdom, to another the message of knowledge by means of the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by that same Spirit, to another miraculous powers, to another prophecy, to another the ability to distinguish between spirits, to another the ability to speak in different kinds of tongues, and to still another the interpretation of tongues. All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, and he gives them to each one, just as he determines.

The body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts; and though all its parts are many, they form one body. So it is with Christ. For we were all baptized by one Spirit into one body-whether Jews or Greeks, slave or free-and we are all given the one Spirit to drink. Now the body is not made up of one part but of many. If the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason cease to be part of the body. And if the ear should say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason cease to be part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? If the whole body were an ear, where would the sense of smell be? But in fact God has arranged the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be. If they were all one part, where would the body be? As it is there are many parts; but one body.

The eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" And the head cannot say to the feet, "I don't need you!" On the contrary, those parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and the parts that we think are less honorable we treat with special honor. And the parts that are unpresentable are treated with special modesty, while our presentable parts need no special treatment. But God has combined the members of the body and has given greater honor to the parts that lacked it, so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts

should have equal concern for each other. If one part suffers, every part suffers with it, if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it.

Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it. And in the church God has appointed first of all apostles,, second prophets, third teachers, then workers of miracles, and those having gifts of healing, those able to help others, those with gifts of administration, and those speaking in different kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? Do all have gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? But eagerly desire the greater gifts. And now I will show you the most excellent way. NIV

This struck me as an important message as we focus on Stewardship in the coming month. We have learned that stewardship is a way of life where we remember that all we have is given to us by our generous and gracious heavenly Father.

We all have various gifts and talents to share and all are valuable to our church, our community, our mission efforts, and the global church. Some have the gifts of hospitality to welcome others and make them comfortable. Others are able to build and create needed items. Some are teachers who pass on valuable lessons. Those musically gifted allow us to worship with hearts and voices. Preachers, speakers, and writers guide us to understand Bible lessons that apply to our daily life. Cooking, serving, and cleaning are gifts of service that nurture our bodies and spirits. We should not be envious of the gifts of others but seek to use and share our own gifts to the glory of God.

In October, we are invited to make a pledge to financially support the Mission and programs of Salem Lutheran Church. In order to welcome people to Jesus Christ, equip people with a faith that works in their lives, and send people into the world to serve in Jesus' name it takes all of us sharing our financial resources, our time, and our talents.

Please give thought to this passage from 1 Corinthians and consider what God has determined to be your part in the body of Christ as you consider your pledge for the coming year.

As I was sitting down to write something for this issue of the Connection, I received an e-mail from a good friend of ours. She was sharing a story that she had received that really touched my heart. 'No, honey. We'll wait until it slows down a bit,' Mom replied.

Opening Prayer was led by Di Hein.

Congregational Input: None

Additions to Agenda: Debra Flam was present to discuss the requirements of the title company with regards to the sale of the donated property. A motion that Ken Stebbins, President of Salem Lutheran Church Council, is recognized as a designated delegated official with the authority to sign the Delegation of Authority Letter pertaining to the sale of property located at 22094 Shady Walk Circle, Deerwood, MN 56444 was seconded. Motion carried.

Approval of Minutes:

- The following actions were recently taken by written agreement of the Council without the benefit of a
 face to face meeting: To have one service at 9:00 a.m. on August 12, 2018. The following members of
 the Council have given their written consent to the action—Randy Holmvig, Mark Carlson, Meriellen
 Pisarek, Kris Schmidt, Terry Tichenor, Ken Stebbins, Di Hein, Sherri Godfrey, and Pastor Mike Briggs.
 The Action by written agreement is hereby recorded and ratified by the Council.
- Motion to approve Council Minutes from the August 2nd special meeting was seconded. Motion carried.
- Motion to approve Council minutes from the August 7th special meeting was seconded. Motion carried.
- Motion to approve Council minutes from July 19th was seconded. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report:

- Item 7105 office expenses is a little higher this month due to a large supply order.
- Item 7205 \$300.00 was spent to spray the outside of the church for insects.
- There were five Sundays, this month. The envelope giving was great this month.
- Motion to accept the Treasurer's Report was seconded. Motion carried.
- Discussion regarding the need to do a corporate contact change for the church credit card as Greg was the primary contact. Motion Pastor Mike be designated as primary person for the Salem's corporate credit card account was seconded. Motion carried.
- Paul does not have information on Summerfest yet. He offered to come to the September meeting to give a full report.
- Discussion regarding the small usage of the washer and dryer in the back room of the kitchen. Kitchen
 coordinators would like to remove the washer and dryer to create more storage space. Council
 approved removing the washer and dryer.

Pastor's Report:

• Pastor Mike was absent from the meeting. However, Council liked the new way new members are being welcomed to Salem. 2 people were received into membership at Salem on July 31st, Leah Burt and Colin Barnett. The Welcome Team found we were losing folks who would like to join due to schedule conflicts for orientation class and new member Sundays, and to the long wait for the next class (up to 6 months). They decided to try a new process for receiving new members quickly. When a person indicates an interest to join Salem a pastoral visit will be scheduled. At that visit the pastor will get to know the person, answer questions, receive household information, and begin orienting them to Salem. If they want to joint Salem, they will become a member at that time. They'll be matched with a "befriender" (ideally a Salem member they already know) who will help assimilate the new member(s) into the life of the congregation for a year by inviting them to church and social functions, worshipping together, etc. When there are a minimum of 6 new members, a New Member Sunday will be scheduled for public recognition of the group.

- Salem West is looking at hiring a warehousing person.

Unfinished Business:

- Salem Employee Compensation Working Group is being placed on hold until all information is in and then at that time meeting date will be set.
- Capital Appeal as of May, 2018 we have met 20% of our goal. That is encouraging. Next meeting will be in January, where they will recap the first year.

New Business:

- Discussion was held regarding the process on how to hire a new Director of Outreach. It was agreed that a committee of Council and Outreach should work together to put together a job description. Committee members possibly should be the same as the Salem Employee Compensation Working Group.
- Council agreed that it was a great idea to purchase a welcome gift for Aeropipe, a new local business. Also discussed possibly bringing employees of Aeropipe to Salem, Salem West and Mustard Seed for a tour.
- There is a need to determine who has a key to the church and who has security codes to access the building. It was agreed that there should be an article in the newsletter and eblast requesting those with keys or security codes to contact the church office.
