Several pastors in the area found that biking has several parallels to what we are experiencing in these days of Covid. Pr. David Peterson from St. John's, Cedarbrook shared some of his thoughts.

Bikers do not like "false tops." What are "false tops"?

A "false top" is when you are riding up a steep hill and thinking you are

almost to the top but...when you crest that perceived "top," you find that it is not the top of the hill at all. Your mind and body are ready to exhale, rest and coast. But another hidden hill awaits you.

When it comes to these months of Covid, the "false top" analogy sounds familiar, doesn't it? First it's masks, then vaccinations, then boosters. And every time we think we're going to get back to "normal" a new variant pops up and it feels like we just took 2 steps backward. So, we ask, "Where is the top of this wicked ride called 'Covid?'" Here we are, as a nation and as a church, climbing proverbial hills...hills with all sorts of "false tops." How do we climb the hills ahead?

In biking, there are two ways to climb a hill. One way is to charge ahead with power and reckless abandon. Bicyclists call this style of climbing "pounding and grinding" (pounding the pedals/grinding the gears)." When you know the route and you know the length of the ride, you know not only where the hills are, but you also know where the downhills and the flats are. You can pace yourself for what is ahead...and pound and grind at will!

If we knew the route that Covid would take we could plan ahead. If we knew the end of Covid, we would know when and how to conserve energy and hope. The trouble is, like an unknown, hilly route for a bicyclist, there are many "false tops" that are certain to be ahead of us as a Church.

Bikers know that "pounding and grinding" will not work on unfamiliar hilly routes. Experienced riders learn to "spin" pedal. They gear down, using the leverage of the bike's lower gears to conserve energy for what is ahead.

If you have "pounded and grinded" up hills your whole life (that's me), spinning can, at first, be discouraging because you're pedaling faster and going slower. Shifting from grinding to spinning up hills means retraining your muscles, your expectations and your heart. It shifts the body from anaerobic to aerobic training.

With Covid, the danger of discouragement and burnout is real. The hills have gotten steeper and the route ahead, less certain. I suppose we can keep grinding and pounding as Church...doing the same things over and over again and expecting different results. But dreaming and hoping we'll get back to "normal" may set us up for disappointment on this ride. We need to retrain our minds, our spirits, and our bodies to more of a "spinning" approach. We need to learn new habits in worship, service, study and outreach in order to avoid being burned out, individually and as churches. Retraining and learning new habits is very hard. (...and we are not just talking biking here).

Another habit that experienced bikers learn is that the best way to conquer hills is to travel in a team. There is an enormous boost from riding in a group. In fact, pace lines (riding in a line/group of riders) can increase your speed by as much as 2-3 mph on a long ride! We are not only better together when biking, but we are also better together as church.

So how do we face the hills ahead? We look back at was behind us and learn from it. Then we train and plan and work together for what is ahead...as best as we can.

I had never fished! I had zero fishing gear.


I took a chance and joined 18 strangers on my first fishing trip. We went to the most beautiful lake you can imagine with all kinds of islands and wildlife.

Salem Outreach Update

As a Non Profit Executive director I started when Love In the Name of Christ was relatively small, one full time staff and two part time and over 60 volunteers. On my first day I was told the mortgage balloon payment was due in 6 months. \$180,000 was needed to be raised to pay off the building and keep the doors open. It was a shock I didn't see coming, but with the grace of God and the help of the community, this was the first of many obstacles we had to overcome. Over the course of 8 years we grew and launched new and exciting programs. In 2019 we had 7 full time staff and thought we were doing so well. Once COVID hit things changed. We had to make a decision to stay open and press on, or close, probably for good. Love INC in Fairbanks landed a federal grant to help with COVID relief and the nonprofit grew overnight.

I tell this story because Salem Outreach is in much the same position as Love INC was when I started. Things are going ok but not great. There is a need to overcome some of the obstacles we face as an outreach of Salem Lutheran. My main concern is Salem Lutheran budgeted to burn \$77,365 in reserves in 2022. The outreach ministries have a total unrestricted cash reserve of roughly \$128,000. To put it another way Salem Outreach will spend 60% of the reserves this year without a sustainability plan in place.

To make matters worse, the Mustard seed net income for January was only \$250.95 after expenses. Salem's Outreach income for the month of January was \$795.96 while expenses were \$22,526.04 with a net loss of (-\$21,730.08). At this burn rate we have 6 months' cash reserves.

I asked the Outreach Governing Board a simple question, what is our sustainability plan? The OGB is formulating a plan to increase our fundraising events, and work to identify areas we can reduce spending.

This is where I need your help, Salem Outreach is not sustainable. I know that for many in our community this ministry is vital and has impacted someone you know very closely. Today Salem needs your help. This year we will need to focus on closing the budget gap of \$77,000. You can help in many ways, consider designating your gift to Salem Outreach, share the ministry with your friend and encourage their support, host a fundraiser, set up a monthly recurring donation of \$10, or stop by and give of your time.
